Become a Kinderenergy Fellow/ Summer Program For Global Undergraduates/ 2022-2027



Introduction

Undergraduate students from around the world selected to become a *Kinderenergy Fellow* meet in New York City for an in-depth analysis of how politics, diplomacy and international policies change with each new president, shape geo-politics such as the Russian - Ukrainian - USA conflict, the Palestine - Israel War, the Taiwan-China problem, the world's energy crisis, international development, the environment, food production, and the drive to net zero by 2050.

Under the leadership of Elisabeth Anne Delgado, CEO & Founder of Kinderenergy, students will network, write papers and speak with global experts about the historical, economic and social factors that are influencing peace, war and policies affecting transformative issues such as children, families, motherhood, education, sanitation, economic development, global health, youth employment, and efforts at peace through







partnerships.

Kinderenergy believes that children are Earth's most important natural resource. Kinderenergy has Special Consultative Status with the United Nations Economic & Social Council and Observation Status with the UNFCCC.

Three week program for English speaking youth

This two to three-week program at the United Nations introduces top tier, inquisitive students of economics, diplomacy, medicine, international law, engineering, architecture & journalism to the mission of Kinderenergy, while also examining the pressing events affecting the development of children today and the quiet diplomacy being used within the UN to eradicate global poverty and bring economic prosperity and peace to the world. Students will take a critical view of the UN policies to see whether

they are actually improving the lives of the poor, promoting efficient energy solutions, improving women's health or actually making it more difficult for all those trying to move out of poverty. In addition, students will advocate for greater role of children as global solutions providers in areas such as disaster risk reduction, innovative sustainability, entrepreneurship and justice around the world.

In the past we have had briefings by experts from the energy industry, the UN Foundation, United Nations Office for Disaster Risk Reduction, Global Foundation For Democracy & Development, the Missions of Portugal, Spain, Denmark, Mexico, Nepal, Japan, and Bangladesh to the United Nations and Regions Refocus.

FOCUS AREAS:

SDGs: Eradicate poverty, educate the children, stimulate entrepreneurship, create youth employment, provide clean drinking water at schools and provide energy to all people are at the heart of a historic agreement signed in 2015 by member states of the United Nations. That agreement, called "Transforming Our World: The 2030 Agenda for Sustainable Development," is a universal call to end poverty, secure justice, and protect the planet for future generations by the year 2030. What are the social and financial costs of this Agenda and, is it really helping those who need it most?

We will find good answers to big questions: Social Justice is a term much used these days but what does it actually mean for everyone? How will this social agenda be financed? By whom and how much will it cost annually? Why is nuclear energy not a hot topic when it is a powerful, clean, reliable source of low carbon energy with the potential of satisfying the energy needs of a growing world? There is a push to mandate use of electric vehicles but why is Switzerland asking its citizens to limit its use? If we are interested in feeding the hungry why are we getting rid of farms in the EU and the USA? These are just some of the questions we will delve into using rigorous research, examining scientific data and speaking to those who should know.

Youth need to understand what is happening around them and learn how they can contribute to ensuring a better world for all and where peace and justice reign. Youth need to take the lead.

Students will practice diplomacy from 8:30 am – 6:30 pm Monday thru Friday with evenings & weekends free to sightsee and enjoy New York City and the surrounding areas.







Application Fee is a non-refundable donation of \$50.00.

The Global Peacemaker Summer Program is designed for exceptionally bright undergraduates. The working language will be in English. Foreign students must have a Toefl score of at least 100 to be eligible to attend the program.

A typical day at UN in New York includes:

- § Breakfast at residence or hotel followed by a walk to the UN
- § Morning meeting & schedule
- § Attend official UN committee meetings, speak with delegates
- § Lunch at the UN with other youth delegates
- § Briefings and discussion with UN officials and practitioners
- § Dinner at residence, invitation to embassy, or out on the town visits.

Participants will have time for cultural activities on weekends and for trips to Boston & D.C.

Academic credits for the 2022-2027 Global Peacemakers Summer Program should be directed by each students' home university.

All donations must be made to Kinderenergy.org. Donation amount does not include travel costs, shared housing, medical insurance or food.

Accommodation/Housing help can be offered to each student as an additional cost. Typically, this cost is between \$1,000 and \$2,000 for a shared room in Manhattan during program.
